

FROM THE BISHOP: REFLECTIONS ON THE FEAST OF THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

In advance of the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord on Jan. 12, Bishop David M. O'Connell, C.M., shared his thoughts on the meaning of Jesus' Baptism:

Jesus was baptized by John who had come to "prepare his way" so that Jesus could begin his divine mission to save from their sins those whose humanity he now shared. . . . "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world (John 1:29)," John the Baptist proclaimed. The Father's voice was heard, "This is my beloved Son . . . stepping into the place of sinners (Joseph Ratzinger/ Pope Benedict XVI, Jesus of Nazareth)."

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is the end of the Church's liturgical season of Christmas but the mysteries of Christ's life, death and resurrection that constitute our own Baptism in the Church continue to unfold.

N.J. COMPENSATION PROGRAM DEADLINE EXTENDED FOR CHILDHOOD VICTIMS OF CHURCH SEXUAL ABUSE

Camille S. Biros and Kenneth R. Feinberg, administrators of the New Jersey statewide Independent Victim Compensation Program, announced Jan. 2 that the program's deadline has been extended to Jan. 31, 2020, for the registration of new allegations and to Feb. 15, 2020, for the submission of all claims.

The program was implemented and supported by all five Roman Catholic dioceses in the state of New Jersey to provide compensation to eligible victims who were sexually abused as minors by clergy of these dioceses.

"We have had several requests from individuals who have just recently become aware of the program and did not submit their registrations or claim forms before the deadlines," said Camille S. Biros, IVCP co-administrator, adding, "We and the dioceses want to be as inclusive as possible in allowing victims to file with the program." ► POPE PRAYS FOR DIALOGUE AS TENSIONS MOUNT BETWEEN U.S., IRAN

VATICAN CITY – Pope Francis led pilgrims in prayers for peace as tensions between the United States and Iran escalated following the assassination of a top Iranian general.

Several days after Ayatollah Ali Hosseini Khamenei, Iran's supreme leader, warned of "harsh retaliation" for the Jan. 3 U.S. drone attack that killed General Qassem Soleimani, the Pope said that "a terrible air of tension is felt in many parts of the world."

"War only brings death and destruction. I call on all parties to keep alive the flame of dialogue and self-control and avoid the shadow of enmity," the Pope said after praying the Angelus prayer with pilgrims gathered in St. Peter's Square Jan. 5.

He then led the pilgrims in a moment of silent prayer so "that the Lord may give us the grace" of peace.

The drone strike, which killed Soleimani and six other people, including an Iraqi militia commander, caused a sharp escalation in already tense relations after President Donald Trump pulled out of the nuclear deal with Iran last year.
